For the "a" pieces, use medium and dark shades of your favorite school's colors; for the "b" pieces, use light gray; and for the "c" pieces, use white. The "c" pieces are the background. The cutting and sewing instructions are attached.

Allison in Toronto – Special Report!

I recently was in
Toronto for a few days and
it rained almost the entire
time. We took advantage
of the rainy days to check
out a couple of interesting
museums.

The Textile Museum of Canada is a small museum devoted to textiles. Tours are offered which we did



not do and admission is not too expensive and there is a senior discount! One floor has a rotating exhibit of items from their extensive collection of textiles.

The exhibit we saw "Gathering", focused on themes relating to migration, family traditions, with textiles, clothing, beaded works from many different cultures. There were also some videos of people talking about their traditions. This exhibit rotates periodically to show different pieces.

On the same floor as this exhibit there is a large room used as a classroom and as a sales room. Donated items, used books, yarn, fabric are for sale here. There are two full sized floor looms and two table top looms. Classes are giving in several different textiles arts.

The larger special exhibit was "The Secret Codes: African Nova Scotian Quilts". This exhibit was organized by BANNS. (Black Artists Network of Nova Scotia). David Woods, an artist did many drawings of village life in Nova Scotia. Several quilters used these small drawings as inspiration for their quilts which were done in the stained glass style. These were not as impressive to me because they were all very similar and seemed more his art work than the quilter's artwork. Other quilts shown where individual works, some were pretty wonky. Others took inspiration from blocks traditionally used on the Underground Railroad to guide runaway enslaved people.

The Bata Shoe Museum is exactly that. A whole museum devoted to shoes. The permanent exhibit is a history of shoes from ancient times to the present. Very interesting history of foot coverings. Two special exhibits were "Dressed to Impress", footwear and consumerism in the 1980's and "In



Bloom", flowers and other nature motifs on shoes. Flowers painted, embroidered, beaded on shoes many of which were very old. Shoes made of natural material as cork, grass, wood, cotton were shown. The most fun was a whole collection of all different types of shoes, boots from around the world to try on.

The next special exhibit coming is "Exhibit A: Investigating Crime and Footwear". That should be a fun one!

Both museums are definitely worth the time spent and can be visited with time to spare for other activities.



REVISED

SANTA MONICA QUILT GUILD - BLOCK OF THE MONTH - March, 2024

This block, called *Stepping Stones* by Marsha McClosky, is easier to find under "*Frayed Four Patch*" on the internet. We will use three (3) fabrics: red, white, and rose or pink. Your finished block will be a 9 1/2" square.



CUTTING:

From each fabric cut a 2 3/4" strip across the width of the fabric.

Cut two, 2 3/4" squares from the red strip, and two, 2 3/4" squares from the rose/pink strip. From the white strip, cut four 5" lengths.

PUTTING THE BLOCK TOGETHER:

FIRST:

Stitch the remaining long red and pink/rose strips together side by side, lengthwise.

Cut two, 2 3/4" slices across this long red and pink strip. Now you have two red and pink 2 patch units. Reverse one and stitch the patches together, making a 4-patch unit with the red and pink squares in opposite corners. These form the center of the block.

Stich a white rectangle to two opposite sides of this 4-patch unit.

Set this part of the block aside.

NEXT:

Stitch a red square to one end of each of the remaining white rectangles, and a pink/rose square to the opposite end of each white rectangle.


Stich each of these rows to the remaining two sides of the 4-patch unit that you set aside. Make sure that the red squares and the pink squares form diagonal lines across the block.


Your Frayed Four Patch / Stepping Stones Block is done!




SANTA MONICA QUILT GUILD. - BLOCK OF THE MONTH - April, 2024

Here is the Tulip Block. Use your jelly roll strips or cut 21/2' wide strips from any of your fabrics. It uses 3 colors, a dark and a medium for the flower, and a medium to light gray for the background. Your finished block will be an 81/2" square.









CUTTING:

Cut ONE, 21/2" x 18" strip from each of the dark and medium (print or solid) 21/2'wide strips. Place one on top of the other. Slice into TWO 21/2" x 81/2" rectangles. Result: 2 of each color.

Cut <u>SIX</u> 21/2" x 21/2" squares from the background gray. A 21/2" x 18" strip will give you a little extra fabric.

PUTTING THE BLOCK TOGETHER:

'Identify your darkest color as A. The medium shade is B. The background is C. Stitch background squares to the A. and B rectangles as shown above, Notice that only one A and one B rectangle has a background square stitched to both ends. Watch out! These angles make the tulip. Stitch and press the patches to match Steps 1 and 2 in the above diagrams.

Now, join each A to each B, making sure that the rectangle with a background square on each end is placed correctly. See Step 3 in diagrams. Join the two sections together to make your tulip!

WELCOME TO SPRING!

BTW: Use any piecing method you like.


SANTA MONICA QUILT GUILD. — BLOCK OF THE MONTH — May, 2024

Here is the Spool Block. It uses 3 colors, a 5" sauare of any color (charm square), white for the background and black for the spool. BTW, all seams are 1/4" or a scant 1/4". Your finished block will be an 81/2" square.

Block Layout

BEFORE

It Is Stitched



CUTTING:

Cut TWO 3" squares from black fabric Cut TWO 3" squares from the white (background) fabric

Cut TWO $5" \times 21/2"$ strips from black fabric, Cut TWO $5" \times 21/2"$ strips from the white fabric

Cut ONE 5" square of fabric or use a 5" chaarm square

PUTTING THE BLOCK TOGETHER:

Make 4 Half Square Triangle units (HSTs) by placing each white 3" square on top of each 3" black square. Draw a line diagonally across each white square. This is a cutting line. Sew 1/4" on each side of that drawn line. Cut apart on drawn lines. Gently fold white fabric back and finger press seam allowance toward the black fabric. The result will be 4 black and white HSTs.

Next, place an HST unit at each end of the black strips. See diagram above to verify that you have the black triangles facing the correct way. Otherwise, your will have a wonky spool!

Now, place a white rectangle on opposite sides of the 5"square and stitch together.

You now have three rows to stitch together to make your block. Stitching this block together is very similar to stitching the Stepping Stones block together. Be sure to carefully press the seam allowances of each row opposite to the one it will attach to. Your seams will "nest" then, and matching seams will be less of a problem. BTW: Use any piecing method you like.

THE SPOOL BLOCK IS DONE! CONGRATULATIONS!
